OUR NEWEST QUEEN'S SCOUT

You may recall from one of our newsletters that Jason Turvey received his Queen's Scout Award in England in 2001. As we have just added Jason's name to the Honour Board, we thought we should tell you something about him.

Jason joined Mount Stuart Scouts in February 1993 at a ceremony at The Springs on Mt Wellington. After Scouts, he joined the Lenah Valley Rangers and Venturers Group.

To help him qualify for his Queen's Scout Award, Jason worked as an announcer for 18 months at Radio FM103, doing the Saturday evening shift.



At the end of Grade 12, Jason headed to the UK to do a GAP placement for 6 months at the Raywell Park Scout Centre (similar to The Lea near Hobart) at Kingston-upon-Hull. While he was there, he was able to complete the Expedition section to finish off his Queen's Scout Award. Jason was presented with his award by the Duke of Kent on an exceptionally cold day, at a ceremony involving 500 other Queen's Scouts.



Back in Australia, Jason has continued his love of the outdoors and has worked for a year at Guilford Young College as an Outdoor Education Assistant, studied Outdoor Education in Melbourne and currently works at the Jolly Swagman.




WOMEN'S BADMINTON

MOUNT STUART PIGEON WON WARTIME VC



During the Second World War the Australian Army used a house on Mount Stuart as a radio base and to train homing pigeons for use in the War. A new book, titled *Animal Heroes* by author Anthony Hill, devotes a chapter to the exploits of one of these homing pigeons in New Guinea, which culminated in the pigeon being awarded the animal VC, the Dickin Medal. An article in the 'Sunday Tasmanian' of April 24th 2005 related the story of this pigeon.

The bird was based at Madang on the north coast of New Guinea, and was attached to a water transport company, which had the task of ferrying supplies to troops in the front line.



Although each ship had a radio, the crews also carried a pair of pigeons. By July 1945 our pigeon had already flown more than 1,000 miles (1,600km) on 23 missions. On



July 12 the pigeon was travelling with a supply boat which was driven ashore during a violent storm. Radio contact was lost, but the captain managed to scribble a message and release the pigeon, which flew back to base. A rescue ship was sent, and saved the crew and cargo. As a result of its flight, the pigeon was awarded the Dickin medal.

Our thanks to former Mount Stuart resident, Ron Oakes, who played a small part in the training of these pigeons while in the Army during the war, and was able to confirm that this pigeon was indeed a Mount Stuart bird.



JACK JUMPERS By Eric Pinkard

I don't know whether we have jack jumper ants in Mount Stuart as fortunately I have never seen one here.



Perhaps I should say that fortunately I have not been bitten by one, because I am one of at least 4,000 Tasmanians who are highly allergic to their bites.

The last time I was bitten, which was over 30 years ago, I swelled up all over and had to lie down for hours to recover. That was probably my third jack jumper bite, but the trouble is that each time it gets progressively worse and the next time it could be fatal.

Fortunately, there were no jack jumpers where I grew up, so I was not restricted as some children are now, having to wear boots, thick socks and long trousers or jeans when they play outside and carry an epi-pen everywhere to delay the allergic reaction if they get bitten.

Dr Konrad Blackman, a former Mount Stuart boy, is one of the leaders of an internationally renowned clinical trial being conducted at the Royal Hobart Hospital. The trial has developed the only known effective vaccine which can prevent these life-threatening reactions.

Research funding, which has provided this treatment to 60 trial participants over the last 4 years, runs out in December this year. If the programme is discontinued, access to this life-saving treatment will be denied.

The cost to maintain and extend the treatment to other Tasmanians who are at the greatest risk amounts to around \$200,000 per year, but the Tasmanian Government has so far refused to commit to continuing the funding.

The support organisation, *antallergy.org*, got a good hearing from the Minister for Health, David Llewellyn, so I am hopeful that there is relief in sight for me and my fellow sufferers who are allergic to jack jumper stings.

MOUNT STUART BUS SERVICE



We have had some feedback complaining about the poor bus services for those who rely on public transport.

The services during the week are OK, with the exception of the early morning.

The weekend services have been described as appalling with only one bus to Mount Stuart (Sat pm) but none to the City all weekend!

It has been suggested that the West Hobart buses continue to Mount Stuart, particularly at weekends. As labour is Metro's biggest cost, and extending the routes would not take much longer, this is definitely worth considering.

STUPIDITY AWARD (1)

TOXOPLASMOSIS

According to wildlife veterinarian David Obendorf, Toxoplasmosis (Toxo) is a hidden disease threat to our environment.

Toxo affects many species of animals and birds and can even affect humans. Cats defecating in children's sand pits, playground areas and gardens contaminate the soil, which can infect humans.



Toxoplasmosis infection of pregnant women can lead to brain and eye damage to the newborn. It can also be fatal to humans who are immuno-suppressed, eg people on cancer therapies.

In rural Tasmania, Toxo is very serious and a common cause of abortion in sheep and goats. It is often found in a variety of fresh meats including mutton, pork, venison and game.



Feral cats and domestic cats that stray into bushland can carry Toxo, which is fatal to many species of marsupials and could be causing local extinctions.

Cat control is the first step in controlling this disease.

- De-sex you cat – so no unwanted kittens.
- Feed your cat on dried or tinned food, as they don't contain Toxo.
- Impose a cat curfew at night.
- Fit your cat with a collar, two bells and an id tag.
- Buy your cat from a local cat centre.
