DIRECTIONAL DRILLING

People who take a keen interest in work in progress in their streets have noticed a new technology for laying gas pipes. In some instances, the traditional trench digging usually associated with laying underground pipes or cables has been replaced by using new machinery capable of drilling horizontal holes, and pulling the new gas pipes through the new holes. Even more remarkable, as the drill progresses like some giant mechanical

earthworm, it can veer to left or right, and up or down, popping out of the road surface at the exact spot required. How is this done?

This remarkable new technology is called Directional Drilling. It is being used in many drilling activities, from drilling oil wells to laying gas mains in Mount Stuart. Horizontal directional drilling (HDD) is now a key technology for infrastructure installation. It makes it possible to take a pipeline or utility conduit directly below virtually any obstacle with only an entry and an exit hole and a very high degree of accuracy. The HDD in our streets is one of the simplest applications.

To steer a drill in the desired direction requires two things:

- A drilling machine which can steer the drill bit to order.
- A knowledge of the position of the drill bit at all times.



The first is generally achieved by using a drill bit which has a larger diameter than the drill stem, and by having some mechanism of wedging the drill stem away from the centre of the drill hole, causing the drill bit to 'run off'. A simpler method used on the machine in Mount Stuart is to use a drill bit with teeth on one side only, and to put pressure on the drill when the teeth are at the side to which the hole is to be steered.

The techniques for knowing the position of the drill bit depend on the latest electronic equipment for detecting underground pipes and cables.

On Mount Stuart, the underground position of the drill bit is followed by an operator carrying electronic detection equipment. This operator directs the drilling machine operator using radio contact. On completion of a hole, the drill bit is directed to the surface, usually to a small hole dug for the purpose. The drill bit is removed from the end of the drill stem, and a length of gas pipe is attached. The drill stem is then withdrawn to the drilling machine, pulling the gas pipe through the hole in the process. Finally, the position and depth of the gas pipe is marked at intervals on the road surface in white paint, to be entered on record drawings so that the position of the pipe can be found at a later date when customers request connections.



AN AAMI AD?

Doug Parkinson MLC reports: *On Friday night, 3rd February at about 11.15, a car travelling down Elphinstone Road in dry conditions lost control on the corner adjacent to Rosina Court. It side-swiped a Subaru Sportswagon parked outside No 39 and then crashed into the rear of a white station sedan parked outside No 35, pushing this vehicle across the footpath and through the front*



fence of No 33 and into a BMW parked in the driveway of No 33. The offending vehicle ended up wedged across the concrete lip (and 2 guideposts) that separates the road from the gutter outside No 33.



Residents are no doubt aware that sections of Elphinstone Road are cambered the wrong way and caution needs to be exercised, especially when the road is wet.

THE GAS ROLLOUT

The gas mains are randomly extending their way across Mount Stuart. We are surprised that residents are not being given the opportunity to connect when the main is laid, particularly where there is an open trench.

Finally, some information on connecting to the gas is being provided to households. It's a pity this information was not available sooner, as it may have influenced heating, cooking and hot water system decisions made over the past 12 months or so.

AUGUSTA RD/ NEW TOWN ROAD CORNER DEVELOPMENT

Woolworths have submitted plans to the Council to redevelop the service station site on the junction of Augusta Road and New Town Road. There was some opposition to the plans, but the Progress Association is not opposed to the development, as it considers the entry and exit problems will be no worse than before and probably better. Woolworths will establish a green belt between the petrol outlet and St James Church.

**SOUTHERN TASMANIA COUNCILS
AUTHORITY**

The 12 Southern Tasmanian Councils are proposing to establish an authority to co-ordinate planning in Southern Tasmania. The Council of Hobart Progress Associations has made a submission to the Hobart City Council offering qualified support and recommending that provision for community involvement should be provided, and that the proposed powers of the new authority should be strengthened as a means of overcoming some of the disadvantages of having 12 separate Councils in Southern Tasmania.

PEACOCK CENTRE



The Government is considering changing the use of the Peacock Centre to solely administration, which would leave the present day care clients without a facility.

At the moment there are about 100 clients with mental health problems who use the centre regularly and rely on its services. The loss of the facility would be most upsetting for them, unless a viable alternative is provided.



Local businesses and residents know the clients and provide assistance if necessary. Many clients probably choose to live in the area so they are close to the Centre. A change to another facility, wherever that is, would be distressing for many of them.

Other refuges and shelters in the area also rely on the Centre for support in times of crisis.

Peacock was left to the people of Tasmania as a convalescent hospital; its use should not be changed to suit the political expediency of the bureaucrats.

We fail to understand the machinations of the Health Department and are seeking more information from them.

STORMWATER TRAP



Residents should be aware that if you are thinking about doing renovations you may be compelled to spend a lot of money having your stormwater drainage upgraded.

We know of one household which is up for a bill of \$16,000 to connect up the stormwater.

The problem is many houses on the bottom side of the street do not have a stormwater easement at the lower end of the property. Instead of biting the bullet and putting in an easement for all the affected properties, Council is insisting on individual connections to the stormwater drain on the street.

Do not think that because your roof gutter is above street level, you will be OK. If you have more than 30m² of concrete or bitumen, you will be forced to put in a drainage pit, which will be below street level, meaning digging a big hole for the sump, probably 12m³ or more, and installing a pump.



So think carefully before you go to Council with building plans which may trigger a change to your stormwater connections.

COMMUNITY MEETING

Are you concerned about the threat of terrorism? Should you be?

Whether you are or not, you may be interested to learn something about what Australia's response to the threat of international terrorism is likely to be.



The third in the series of morning meetings aimed at fostering a sense of neighbourhood at Mount Stuart and, incidentally, improving the occupancy rate of the Hall, will be held on Friday, 28 April, at 10.30 am, with morning tea to follow.

Guest speaker will be Commander Tony Mulder, one of Tasmania Police's most senior officers and the Director of the State Security Unit. His presentation will cover, among other things, such matters as the role of Hobart in protecting itself in the event of a terrorist attack.



ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING INVITATION

Our guest speaker, Dr Heidi J Auman, will give a power point presentation entitled **Midway Island: Seabirds, Research and Life in a Sub-Tropical Paradise** about her time on Midway Island.

The appropriately named Midway Island, part of the Hawaiian and Midway Island Group, is renowned for its birdlife and was of strategic importance in World War II as, despite its small size of 6.2 sq km, it has 3 airports.

Heidi has spent the last 18 years studying human impacts on seabirds over the world, including the North American Great Lakes, Midway Island, Heard Island and Tasmania. She has a Master's degree in Fisheries and Wildlife and is currently working on her PhD at the UTAS School of Zoology.



Heidi lived almost eight years on Midway Island, a tiny historic atoll in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. She will share her stories of living cheek-to-beak with millions of seabirds and shorebirds and her time on Midway Island.



The presentation comes highly recommended, so come along to the Hall on **Wed Mar 29 at 8.00pm.**
