Tribute was paid to Jeff Ransley who passed away in November. Jeff made a significant contribution to many aspects of the Progress Association over several years.


Regret was expressed at the lack of a focal meeting point for the area – there is no place for residents to gather casually.

Those attending the AGMs were treated to a very entertaining and informative presentation from marine scientist, Dr Gretta Pecl. Gretta, who is a Fulbright scholar, author of many published articles and holder of many awards, spoke about the Redmap Project which she has established.

The Redmap Project, a joint project between scientists and people who fish, recreationally and commercially, aims to

discover which species are moving where. Fishers are asked to take digital photos of species they see or catch and note the date, location and time. They send their photos to Redmap where specialist scientists identify and validate the species. In this way, scientists can map the changes in fish distribution and determine how warming waters may be affecting our marine environments.

Numbers of fish previously only found around Sydney have been sighted in Tasmanian waters. The fishers can also take photos of any other creatures they spot, including turtles and birds. These photos are sent to museums where experts correctly identify the species, giving valuable data on many animals and birds.

Gretta stated that the East Australian Current, a warm sub-tropical current flowing down the east coast of Australia, was pushing further down the Tasmanian coast and staying longer throughout the year. The rise in water temperature off the east

coast of Tasmania has been 3.8 times the global average of water temperature rise.

Added to this, our oceans are now 30% more acidic than they were at the time of the industrial revolution. Warm water is less oxygenated and contains fewer nutrients than cold water, so there is a significant shift in the marine species as they move to find food and their preferred temperature range.

As it is vital to have the correct data to manage Tasmanian fish stocks into the future and there are not enough scientists to collect the needed data, this co-management by the fishing public and the scientists is an important way to increase the data base. Since there are over 120,000 recreational fishers in Tasmania, that means there are 120,000 people who can add to this database. Interest in the site has been huge; Redmap has received over 10,000 visits to the website with over 46,000 pages downloaded from the website, from 96 different countries. Several other countries are now considering developing a Redmap project of their own!

FROM THE SCHOOL

The first phase of the building programme has begun – two classrooms will be built, the General Purpose hall and adjoining toilets will be refurbished and remodelled, the Grade 1/2 classrooms will be remodelled and the cottage will be replaced by two colourful classrooms like those above the netball court. This means that traffic and parking will again be an issue, so everyone is urged to take care at all times.

The school has adopted James Semmens as part of the Adopt-a-Cop programme. This aims to provide schools with a Police Officer who becomes a role model and an avenue for children to get to know and trust police as friends. James is also a parent at the school. (He's also our webmaster, so he's a pretty busy man.)

HOBART CITY COUNCIL NEWS

Council is currently developing a Community Consultation Policy which would use associations like the Progress Association as a medium for issues which merit community consultation.

The City Council is fully in favour of compulsory voting for all ratepayers, by ballot box, rather than by mail, at local government elections.

Professor Jan Gehl, internationally acclaimed urban designer, is expected back in Hobart in August with a preliminary draft of his Inner City Development Plan "A City with People in Mind". He will present his final report in December. Don't miss his public lectures.

THE YEAR OF THE GIRL GUIDE

2010 was designated the national year of the Girl Guide to commemorate the centenary of the movement. The Scouts celebrated their centenary in 2008 and now it is the turn of the Guides.

The movement was the result of the efforts of several small groups of girls who turned up at the Scouts' first rally at the Crystal Palace in 1909 and insisted that they wanted to be scouts too.

In an age when skirts were ankle length and young ladies never ran, the idea of girls being involved in camping, hiking and similar activities received a mixed response. Angry critics denounced 'girl scouting' as a 'mischievous new development', a 'foolish and pernicious movement' and an 'idiotic sport'.

However Baden Powell's letters from the time indicated that he had in mind a scheme for girls.

He decided that there should be a different identity for the girls so that they could work for self development separately and not in competition with their brothers. He recalled being impressed by the resilience and leadership skills of the Ghurkha Guides he had encountered in India on the north-west frontier. His sister Agnes was charged with looking after the new movement and a few years later his wife, Olave, became involved and in 1918 was appointed Chief Guide.

There are numerous events to commemorate the centenary – *Campfires around the Nation*, including one in St David's Park, will take place on June 19th and on October 10th reunions are planned around the country.

CALLING ALL GUIDES

Mount Stuart Guides commenced in 1952 with Brownies starting soon after. Both groups were really active and successful for over 40 years with great leaders like Marj Wall and Lesley Hurburgh. They produced about 15 Queen's Guides. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I am writing to enquire whether other people on Mount Stuart share my concern at the increasing number of house and garden alterations which are taking place without being advertised by the Hobart City Council and hence without any opportunity for input from neighbours.



While it is appreciated that such works may conform with Council's planning rules, (and objections from neighbours are therefore of little or no significance

to Council), nevertheless it is considered that Mount Stuart needs special consideration because of heritage values which are not adequately incorporated in planning rules.

Hobart City Council has on its web site a copy of a Mount Stuart Heritage Review compiled by Ian Terry in 2003 for the Council, which lists some forty houses as places of State and/or National Significance, and makes recommendations for their conservation. This seems to be totally ignored by Council planners.

Inappropriate developments of adjoining properties can ruin a property. There are at least two such alterations currently taking place, destroying our heritage.
