A LOCAL LEGEND

Reg McDougall is looking forward to the Christmas season. It will be his 53rd on Mount Stuart, and one he enjoys sharing with the expanding generations of McDougall

descendants, and his neighbours in the eight houses of Paraclete Avenue and two on the corner of Mount Stuart Road. Each year the neighbours alternate for a street Christmas party and this year, on December 16, it is Reg's turn. "I'd better make the most of it because I don't think I'll see the next one," said 87-year-old Reg. He'll be 94 when his turn comes around again.



The gathering, he explains, epitomises the spirit of the Mount Stuart community he has come to know, where neighbours have become good friends. Among them are his daughter Janne and his granddaughter Anna, who now lives elsewhere on Mount Stuart. Paracletians they are called – a term generated by a former resident of the street, Fred Frampton. And if they have as many stories to tell as Reg, it will be quite a gathering.

His own story carries with it the spirit of the bush, of the sea, of travelling in Tasmania and to his beloved Scotland, freemasonry, fishing and business.

Logging, sawmilling, saws and sharpening were already in the blood when Reg was born at Taranna in 1925. The first McDougall to arrive in Tasmania was William Parker McDougall, who landed as a seaman in the

1840s. There were successful family sawmills down on the Peninsula, and at Catamaran, and for five years a three-masted schooner built by Wilson Bros, the *Annie McDougall*, carted timber to

Adelaide and around the Tasmanian coast until she hit a reef near Hell's Gates at the entrance to Macquarie Harbour in 1900 and could not be saved, although her crew



were. In the 1930s his father, Sydney McDougall, was a regular around the streets of Hobart, at a time when saw-sharpening was a trade in demand; sharpening, setting and grinding for many businesses, particularly with butchers and their knives and saws.

When war broke out in 1939, Reg was just 14 and too young to go to war, unlike his three older brothers who all joined up and went away. Reg's chance to make a contribution came in the merchant navy, which he joined in 1942 as a fireman, working his way up to be a greaser on vessels sailing between Canada and the UK, and surviving when the merchant navy had a high attrition rate from German U-boats. Returning to Tasmania, he continued at sea on vessels trading in and out of Hobart, mainly the *Coranui* and the *Lanena*, working as a fireman and serving as the union rep. He 'retired' from the sea in 1947, and joined the State Government; initially as a driver-clerk on the mobile x-ray

unit when there was a campaign to detect tuberculosis. That took him all around the state, to most centres and workplaces and schools, before he transferred to the Premier's Department to become a chauffeur, driving Fords and Chevrolets, premiers and visiting dignitaries.



Reg's working life headed in another direction when he opened a saw-sharpening business at 115 Harrington St, not far from where his brother had a similar business in Brisbane St. He'd been to Melbourne to learn the saw doctoring business and was ready for work. Logging and forestry were important industries and wood fires still heated Hobart homes. There was no shortage of work, and eventually he bought into his brother's Brisbane St business where the name McDougall remains opposite Tilford Motors, now run by his grandson Leith, the third generation of McDougalls to do so after Reg's son, Cam, and the fourth in the saw doctoring business after Syd.



"I'm still on the books there but mostly these days as the letter boy and I go in two to three days a week," an indication of an active man who doesn't like sitting still, although a fall in the backyard and a resulting broken leg four years ago, and more recently a bite from a white-tail spider were setbacks.

Naturally, in fifty-three years on Mount Stuart there have been many changes in people, and places. Improvements to roads and guttering have had a positive effect on the feel of the suburb, but changes to the bus routes have had an impact on him and other older residents used to doing business in North Hobart, and now required to walk down and up from the top of Newdegate St.

Apart from his merchant marine service, travel has figured prominently throughout his life, and there have been 15 journeys to England and Scotland, and trips to the Isle of Lewis have always been highlights. A disappointment, despite a number of attempts, has been his inability to reach the island of Saint Kilda, evacuated in the 1930s.

But back to the Paracletians. One recent example of the strong bonds in the street was a fund-raising venture by the residents to help send a local child to the United States for a special medical operation. With stalls on the 'island' in Paraclete Avenue and donations, they raised \$6,000; a very creditable effort that re-affirmed the street spirit.

There's another reason, a very special reason, Reg is looking forward to the Christmas season, apart from sharing it with his grandchildren and great grandchildren. He and his wife Yvonne will have been married 65 years on January 3!
