KNOCKLOFTY SHINES DURING COVID-19

Knocklofty Reserve has more than proved its worth as an outdoor and exercise resource during COVID-19, judging by daily foot traffic through the park.

Figures released by the Hobart City Council (HCC) show that by the end of June (the latest available figures) the reserve was attracting up to 300 walkers a day from the Forest Road Knocklofty car park along the fire trail.



The Fiona Allan Track daily usage averaged 100 walkers by the end of June, while the summit track was attracting 160 walkers – double the number of users from six months earlier.

HCC has three track counters in the reserve and the data is collected quarterly.

Walter “Wally” Nicholson

14/03/32 - 13/07/20

Wally Nicholson moved to Lenah Valley (Greenway Avenue) in the early 1970s with wife Janise to raise their 10 children. Along with many local sporting commitments with all the children (football, Little Athletics and cricket), Wally was involved in all aspects of their lives and became a life member of many associations over the years.

Wally and Janise had already been a part of the Mount Stuart community since 1968, when they started a ballroom dancing studio at the Mount Stuart Hall, after the old Belvedere Dance Studio in Arygle Street closed. As Tasmanian and Australian ballroom dance champions, they taught hundreds of students over the years – even other Australian champions. An accountant by day, Wally would then teach with Janise in the evenings. They also held weekly social dance classes. They became so popular that when Tasmania hosted the Miss Australia Pageant, all the participants wanted to go dancing, so Wally had the task of finding suitable dance partners for the evening. Miss South Australia returned several months later and became a Mrs Tasmania!

In 1998 Janise passed away, and Wally lost not only his soul mate but his dance partner. He decided to focus again on teaching and returned to ballroom dance teaching at the Mount Stuart Hall with long-term friend Sherry Lendrum, teaching not only pupils, but also other dance teachers. It was only in his 87th year that Wally retired his dance shoes. On Monday 13th July 2020, Wally passed away and was finally able to be reunited with his beloved wife, soul mate and dance partner Janise, to dance together again.



For over half a century the Mount Stuart Hall was central in Wally’s life; everyone waltzing or foxtrotting through it also became part of Wally’s family. Vale Wally.

WEERONA AVENUE FLOOD PROTECTION PETITION

Weerona Avenue residents have submitted a petition to the Council seeking a cut-off drain be constructed above the houses on the western side of the street to hopefully protect their properties from flooding. This was explained in our article in the December 2019 edition of this publication.

Hobart City Council officers have recommended the petition be refused. This will be considered by HCC at its meeting on September 7th.

The principal reasons for the refusal are that the flooding is a result of run-off from natural bush catchment and that constructing a cut-off drain would increase stormwater in the downstream piped network. We do not agree with the latter statement as all the run-off water will end up in the stormwater system anyway.

Mount Stuart shortcuts and backways

Many of us value the shortcuts, steps and backways between our streets, and the links to other suburbs and to bush reserves.

Since mid-March, with restricted movements and the impetus to exercise locally, these routes have seen increased use. At the top of the popularity list has been the recently developed Lake Fenton Pipeline Track from the end of Weerona Avenue to tracks in the Knocklofty Reserve. It provides a well-formed, elevated but relatively level walk-with-a-view between Mount Stuart and West Hobart: great for exercise and dog-walking and as a route to other areas such as the Hobart Rivulet Linear Park or the City.

The Fiona Allan Track and the steps above the Mount Stuart Lookout offer shorter routes to the heights above, but those who are looking for more moderate gradients can follow the Knocklofty loop to the top after taking the Lake Fenton Pipeline Track.

The reserve looks very healthy following good rain and freedom (mainly) from recent fire – and the Knocklofty Bushcare group does great ongoing work, especially in weed control.

i. You may wonder about the Lake Fenton name – since that lake is far distant in the Mount Field National Park. This route is part of the water supply line from there, as is the reservoir in Benjafield Terrace. (On the Hobart City Council website map of Knocklofty Reserve this track is marked as Mrs Field's Fire Trail. This is probably an inaccurate reference to the Fielding family, previous owners of the land crossed by the track.)

There are many links between the streets of our suburb. Over recent months one of them, between Benjafield Terrace and Darling Parade, was closed for reconstruction of the

steps. The finished product is impressive!

Many steps remain, but at the top, a section of the Darling Parade footpath was reconstructed to eliminate a set of steps.

That is now a moderately graded route suitable for older people or people with prams.
