Fifty years and still going! Badminton at Mount Stuart Hall

Badminton at the hall began on Tuesday 7th February 1967, when a group of mothers met after dropping their children off at the then adjacent Mount Stuart Kindergarten in Raymont Terrace. Little did they know as they played that southern Tasmania's worst-ever bushfires were building rapidly – fires that were to result in wide-ranging destruction and 62 deaths!


Fortunately, the fires didn't burn the hall, although Mt Stuart lost some houses higher up the slopes. Players have kept meeting from then until the present day.



Vicki Martin, who facilitates the group, reports that badminton nearly folded just before COVID, when there were only three women attending. Now there are five to eight women every Tuesday morning from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. Many players did not know one another before they joined.

There is a feeling of optimism for the future, and a continuing keenness for new people to join. They contribute a small fee each week to cover hall hire.

There is no need to have played badminton before: some tuition is available; doubles are played; the court is out of the weather and the floor has some 'give' in it.

More About Nature Strips

Hobart City Council's new approach to the maintenance of nature strips kicked in on 1st April this year – just after Heather Huxley, Acting Program Leader Parks and Reserves with the Hobart City Council, spoke at our Annual General Meetings on 23rd March.

A keenly interested audience of 25 put their questions and concerns to Heather, and in most cases her answers both clarified changes and reassured residents.

Heather outlined the main reason for the change in policy: to redirect funds previously required for regular mowing to the maintenance of street trees and other green spaces around Hobart. If those residents who are able to do so maintain the grass or garden on their nature strips, Council is better able both to maintain nature strips that are too difficult for residents to look after, and to give attention to trees.

This enhances our suburban environment in line with community expectations and Council goals.

Lawn grass nature strips

We are required to maintain these adjacent to our property. If we don't, the Council will mow unkempt grass once a year rather than the previous quarterly arrangement.

Those of us who are physically unable to mow our nature strip can use a form available on the Council website (www.hobartcity.com.au) to apply for assistance. A number of residents have already done this. You can seek this assistance on a permanent or temporary basis.

The Council also provides suggestions for planting of drought-tolerant native grasses that are easier to maintain.

Nature strips with existing trees

We are not permitted to prune, remove or plant trees within nature strips, which remain city assets. The Council employs a team of trained and experienced arborists to carry out this work. They undertake regular inspections and respond to residents' concerns about tree safety. We are also able to request Council to plant or replace trees on nature strips.

Low-growing shrubs, ground cover and mulching

This is a real alternative, and some residents happily embrace it. However, we need to understand that Council will not contribute to the cost of establishing or maintaining nature strips modified in this way. And you must "dial before you dig" to make sure you will not be interfering with services.

Shrubs should not be allowed to grow higher than 600mm (300mm on corners), but Heather assured us that Council will not be monitoring shrubby nature strips with a tape measure! What is important is that lines of sight are not interfered with.

Weerona Ave Fire Trail Stabilising the Embankment

The top embankment on the trail on the southern side of the steps from Bimbadeen Court was beginning to erode badly. In an endeavour to stop the erosion, the City of Hobart has hired a contractor to pin down 180 m2 sheets of weed matting and plant a total of 800 grass plants, which are a mixture of Poa labillardierei (tussock grass), Lomandra longifolia (mat rushes), Austrostipa stipoides (coast spear grass), and Dichelachne crinita (long hair plume grass).

The contractor is required to water the area for three months, then look after it for nine months.
